

Black River

The Black River district is the longest district of the Republic of Mauritius extending over an area of approximately 259 square kilometre with a population estimated to 79,247 as at end of 2012. It is the third longest district of the island located on the western coast of Mauritius

Few historians have documented the history of Black River. However, the popular historian Benjamin Moutou (2002) has drawn an historical overview of the district. According to him, in around 1601, the first Dutch travellers landed in Le Morne Peninsula on the south-western end of the district. From thence onward, the district has been closely associated with the Dutch.



BLACK RIVER DURING THE YEARS OF EXCLUSION AND STIGMATISATION

Black River and especially the south-western part of the district has always been marginalised and ostracised as expounded in anthropological and historical studies. Southwest Black River, during the colonial period, was portrayed as being the land of predilection for the maroon slaves and after the abolition of slavery and until the end of the 20th Century, it was commonly perceived as being inhabited essentially by Mauritians of Afro-Malagasy origins. These perceptions have been the underpinnings for the stigmatisation of the region as being the 'back country' populated by people that are negatively stereotyped by others because of their presumed slave or maroon ancestry.

These years of stigmatisation have negatively impacted on the local, social, economic and cultural development of south Black River that, subsequently, led to its exclusion and marginalisation by the colonial and postcolonial society.

Even if, since the beginning of the 21st Century, Grande Rivière Noire has experienced burgeoning developments with the inward migration of the foreigners and the development of Integrated Resort Schemes and other luxurious gated residences, only part of the local population is benefiting from the positive socioeconomic returns and opportunities of these developments while others are being further victimised and marginalised. The same applies to the village of Petite Rivière Noire which is located at the south end of Grande Rivière Noire when travelling towards Le Morne.

The local population continues to be excluded. The infrastructural landscape and spatial organisation are visual markers of this exclusion with the luxurious residences adjacent to the low cost houses that are enclaved between the dwellings of the higher and middle classes.



There is a "ghettoisation effect" with the impoverished villagers being clustered in localities labelled as "pockets of poverty". These pockets of poverty are: Cité EDC Grande Rivière Noire, Village Le Tamarinier, Camp Robinet, Carré d'As, Petite Rivière Noire and other neighbourhoods where people live in relative poverty and some even in absolute poverty. More than half of the villagers earn less than 6,200 rupees as monthly income.

WHAT IS MEANT BY "POCKETS OF POVERTY"?

This term "pocket of poverty" is a recent concept dating back to the 20th Century that designates neighbourhoods where there is acute poverty and where people live below the poverty line of 6,200 rupees cluster set by the Ministry of Integration and Social Security. These poor neighbourhoods face more social, economic and cultural challenges compared to the others which result in more concentrated disadvantages. The families living in these "pockets of poverty" experience multiple forms of victimisations and of exclusion resulting from their socioeconomic ranking. They are trapped in the circle of poverty and exclusion.





WHAT IS MEANT BY "SOCIAL EXCLUSION"?





Since exclusion is a process which is contextual, there is no universal and fixed definition of exclusion. It is a multidimensional social construction whose definition varies depending on the geopolitical, economic, social, historical and cultural context.

For this social strategic plan, we have adopted a syncretism of the International Labour Organisation's and European Union's definitions of social exclusion as: ...un état de pauvreté qui empêche les individus, premièrement, d'accéder aux conditions de vie qui leur permettraient à la fois de satisfaire leurs besoins essentiels et de participer au développement de la société dans laquelle ils vivent. Deuxièmement, de pleinement participer ou contribuer à la société à cause du déni des droits politiques, civils, sociaux, économiques et culturels....

(a state of poverty prohibiting people, firstly, from reaching living conditions that would allow them to satisfy basic needs and participate in the development of the society in which they live. Secondly, from participating or contributing to society because they are denied political, social, civil, economic and cultural rights...)

WHY THE KOLEKTIF RIVIER NWAR?

Many non-governmental organisations have been set up to cater for the excluded, to provide them with the necessary assistance and guidance to help them improve their life and benefit from the opportunities offered for social mobility. Yet, in 21st Century Mauritius, the people of Petite Rivière Noire, Cité EDC Grande Rivière Noire, Camp Robinet, Village Le Tamarinier and the neighbouring villages, even if they are in the picture, constitute the 'uncomfortable' fringe of society that lack access to decent social, educational and health services, social protection and a great many material goods.

The Kolektif Rivier Nwar took the commitment to combat exclusion in the region of Grande Rivière Noire and Petite Rivière Noire. The non-governmental organisations, members of the association, committed themselves to converge and merge their forces to fight against this social plight and work together towards a common vision that the people of Grande Rivière Noire and Petite Rivière Noire can stand on their feet and continue improving their living conditions. Ultimately, the Kolektif is working towards a sustainable, inclusive and intelligent development of the local community that respects the human rights of all.

The Kolektif Rivier Nwar is one of the pillars that will drive this plan together with the social, economic and strategic partners and the community to ensure that, together, we can give to the children of today and of tomorrow a better future.

After years of experience in that business, Fransco thinks of going on his own. Times are tough, but he doesn't despair. Patiently, he devotes himself to his work and persevere. Ten years ago, he created his own company. Independent today, with more than 20 boats, he has reached his goal.

Involved in the social projects in his Cité, he works to improve the quality of life of the inhabitants. Fransco has also been village councillor since 2013. A function that he manages like a social action.


The strategic plan will be monitored through the following: :

An annual project review shall be conducted during the fourth quarter of the year or soon thereafter, to assess the performance of the project. In the last year, this review will be a final assessment and shall focus on the extent to which progress is being made towards outputs, and that these remain aligned to the outcome.
